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

When violence first escalated last year, we made the incredibly difficult but necessary decision to defer the 2023 edition of Ajyal Film Festival. This year, with escalating violence not just in Palestine but also in Lebanon, bringing Ajyal back was an even harder choice.

#### **Ajyal Competition**

The true stars of our festival are always our young Ajyal Jury. Aged from 8 to 25, they form the juries of the Ajyal Competition, and their involvement and opinions matter dearly to us at DFI. By casting their vote, our jurors decide which directors will receive funding towards their next project, helping to guide, support, and champion cinema that resonates deeply with their generation.

Our competition provides them access to acclaimed international cinema and renowned filmmakers, ensuring they experience moments that matter—ones that will help them develop their understanding of the world around them and grow into confident and mindful global citizens. At its heart, the Ajyal Competition inspires creative thinking, cooperation and self-expression—leading to empowered young minds and friendships that will last a lifetime.

#### **Ajyal Jury**

The Ajyal Competition Jury is divided into three sections by age group. The three juries are:



#### Mohaq

Mohaq means 'New Moon' in Arabic, and these are Ajyal's youngest jurors, aged 8 to 12. These jurors will enjoy one programme of uplifting short films and a selection of enchanting feature-length films.



#### Hilal

Ajyal's jurors aged 13 to 17 make up our Hilal jury, which means 'Crescent Moon' in Arabic. Four fascinating feature films and one programme of inspiring shorts make up this jury's film selection.



#### **Bader**

The most mature of Ajyal's juries, Bader—Arabic for 'Full Moon'—jurors are aged 18 to 25 and will select their favourite films from four compelling features and two programmes of thought-provoking short films.

#### **Awards**


Each of our three Ajyal Juries awards a Best Film prize to their favourite short and feature-length films, for a total of six awards. The directors of the winning films are granted funding toward their next film, giving our jurors the empowering opportunity to nurture and support stories and voices that matter to them the most.

Our youngest audiences vote for their favourite film in the Bariq programme, and a jury of regional industry professionals will decide the best film in the Made in Qatar section. Finally, the general public will decide on our Ajyal Audience Award.

## FESTIVAL FILMS

#### Sudan, Remember Us

France, Tunisia, Qatar / Arabic, English / 2024 76 mins DFI Supported Film



In the face of a repressive military regime, young Sudanese activists Shajane, Maha, Muzamil, and their fellow revolutionaries stand resolute, expressing their resistance through poetry, chants, and creative art. As the country grapples with political turmoil and escalating violence, these activists are driven by a dream of a civilian-led Sudan—a vision they pursue despite the risks to their lives and freedom. Their poetic revolution serves as both a weapon and a form of solace, allowing them to communicate the suffering and aspirations of their generation. As protests intensify, the activists endure relentless challenges: police crackdowns, brutal military actions, and the looming threat of exile. Yet, their words resonate as a call to action, inspiring others within Sudan and beyond.

Through powerful scenes that capture the vibrancy of Sudan's youth, the story provides an intimate glimpse into the spirit of a generation undeterred by hardship. Set against the backdrop of Sudan's contemporary political struggles, this portrait of resilience and hope underscores the profound impact of art and words in confronting oppression. The activists' journey reflects a shared determination to redefine Sudan's future—offering a deeply moving testament to the enduring power of artistic resistance.

#### Made in Qatar Jury

#### Saleh Bakri Head of the Jury



Saleh Bakri is an acclaimed Palestinian actor who is celebrated for his contributions to theatre and cinema both locally and internationally. He began his stage career in 2000 with performances in Palestine, including 'Death and the Maiden', directed by Juliano Mer Khamis, and 'Junoon', directed by Sameh Hijazi. Internationally, he appeared at London's Royal Court Theatre in 'Fireworks', written by Dalia Taha. In cinema, Bakri is known for roles in 'The Time That Remains' by Elia Suleiman and three films by Annemarie Jacir: 'Salt of This Sea', 'When I Saw You', and 'Wajib'. His role in 'Salvo' won the Grand Prix at the Cannes Film Festival's Semaine de la Critique, and he recently starred in 'The Blue Caftan' and 'The Teacher'. His work has earned him numerous accolades, including Best Actor at the Dubai International Film Festival for 'Wajib' and awards from the Festival d'Angoulême and Tangier National Film Festival for 'The Blue Caftan'. Bakri's 2021 role in the Oscar-nominated and DFI-supported 'The Present' further cemented his reputation as a leading figure in Arab cinema

#### Debra Aroko



Debra is a Kenyan filmmaker and producer with a passion for telling stories that capture the nuanced realities of communities facing the effects of a global climate crisis. Her work seeks to highlight the challenges they face while also exploring the resilience and hope that sustain them. Debra serves as a producer at the Solutions Storytelling Project, supported by the Skoll Foundation, overseeing the production of 19 short documentary films from across the African continent. The project connects African filmmakers with social innovators to create solutionsfocused films that inspire positive change in their communities.

#### Amal Al Muftah



Amal Al Muftah is a Qatari Filmmaker and Director. Her filmmaking career began in high school, directing short fiction films and documentaries. During her time at university, Amal directed two awardwinning films, 'Smicha' (2015) and 'Sh'hab' (2018), which travelled to more than 50 festivals worldwide. Entering the art world through filmmaking, she directed a short art film for Qatar Museums' Art Mills exhibition, 'In Memory Of' (2022), and a feature documentary, 'Ode To Our Land' (2023), for the Doha Film Institute (DFI) and the National Museum of Qatar (NMoQ). Her recent work includes 'Light The Sky' (2022), a music video for the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022<sup>™</sup>. After experimenting with

#### **Alkaline**

Qatar / Malayalam, English / 2024

A father's health scare changes his life, leading him to an extreme organic lifestyle in an effort to maintain control over his health. However, his strict routines and dietary restrictions create a rift with his son, who lives a healthy life but does not meet his father's standards. Through conversations and self-reflection, the son attempts to bridge their divide, exploring the underlying fears and family dynamics driving their conflict. The film highlights the complex interplay between personal choices, family expectations and how fear can shape relationships in profound ways.

**Paul Abraham** is an Indian filmmaker based in Qatar whose background in architecture shapes his cinematic storytelling. His work explores narrative and visual composition, blending architectural elements with film. 'Alkaline' marks his continued journey in documentary filmmaking and narrative expression.

**Abdulla Al-Hor**, a Qatari filmmaker with an MA in Film and Media from Johns Hopkins University, focuses on sound recording and design. His recent project, 'The Experiment', is currently in post-production. Al-Hor is also a Teaching Assistant at Qatar University, contributing to film studies.

#### Breshna

Qatar / Arabic / 2024 13 mins



After surviving a brutal terrorist attack in Kabul, Breshna finds herself forced to leave Afghanistan as it falls deeper into unrest. She arrives in Qatar, carrying with her the scars of her past and dreams left behind. This moving short captures her reflections on hope, resilience, and the longing for peace as she comes to terms with loss and survival. Through her story, the film offers a deeply personal perspective on displacement and the strength needed to seek a new beginning amidst painful memories.

Director: Obada Jarbi

Obada Jarbi is a Jordanian-Palestinian filmmaker based in Qatar, with a background in Mass Communication. His debut film, 'Addicted to Alienation' (2016), began as a university project, followed by 'The Fishermen' (2017), his first work selected for various film festivals. Known for his narrative-driven style, Jarbi's project, 'Okht Rjal' (Woman of Steel) (2021), explored resilience through a culturally rooted lens, which is also central to his latest short 'Breshna'—a reflection on loss and the pursuit of peace.

#### Can You See Me?

Qatar / Arabic, English / 2024 6 mins



Trapped in the repetitive cycle of her daily life, Maryam finds herself increasingly isolated and detached from those around her. Amid silent frustrations and unmet expectations, her solitude deepens as she feels invisible in her own world. Faced with an overwhelming sense of loneliness, Maryam is finally driven to confront the reality of her situation and the possibility of change. This evocative short is a reflective journey through the quiet struggles of inner turmoil, exploring resilience and self-discovery.

#### Cochlea

Rokia, a 50-year-old divorced Arab woman, reunites with her twenty-year-old son, Youssef, after six months apart. During their reunion, Rokia insists on performing a ritual she has often imposed on him: washing him. Youssef becomes increasingly frustrated as she washes his hair, scrubs his elbows, and cleans his ears. The ritual feels both mentally and physically painful to him. Despite his resistance, he begins to understand that his mother's unusual way of expressing love and care runs deeper than simply wanting him to be clean.

Karim Emara is an Egyptian-American filmmaker who graduated from Northwestern University in Qatar and is pursuing a Master of Fine Arts in Film & Media at Emerson College. Raised in multiple cultures, Emara navigated a layered identity as an Arab and Muslim in the United States and as a Westerner in Qatar. His experiences have inspired him to create films that explore complex identities and cultural dynamics. His recent short, 'The Chandelier' (2023), won a Best Film award in Qatar and was screened at multiple film festivals across the Middle East. Emara is currently developing his next film, 'The AC' (2024).

#### I Lay for You to Sleep

As women gently wash his body, Ali journeys through memories and reflections, confronting the mysteries of life, death, and rebirth. Drifting between moments of his past and revelations about his loved ones, he seeks answers to profound questions about mortality. This contemplative experimental narrative uses poetic imagery to explore the emotional depths of loss, solitude, and renewal. With its meditative tone and immersive sound design, the film offers a deeply personal and spiritual exploration of how we navigate the abyss of grief and death.

Designed to build on the success of Made in Qatar, this new initiative provides emerging talents with the essential tools and industry insights they need to thrive in the world of filmmaking.

The decision to expand into Made in Qatar Shabab reflects our commitment to supporting the next generation of filmmakers in Qatar. By offering specialised sessions that focus on practical skills and industry know-how, we aim to inspire and equip young creatives to continue the legacy of local storytelling, ensuring that their voices are heard both regionally and globally.

#### I Made a Film, Now What?

Understanding Film Distribution and Getting Your Film Seen

This masterclass empowers young filmmakers to take the next decisive steps after completing their films. From mastering distribution and marketing strategies to building vital industry connections, participants will learn how to effectively get their films in front of audiences. The session also offers key insights into securing funding for future projects and creating a network of lasting relationships within the industry, equipping filmmakers with the tools needed to build a sustainable and successful career.

In this delightful animated short, Boris, a devoted village baker, faces an unexpected challenge when he suddenly develops an allergy to flour. Known for his fresh, crusty bread, Boris must now devise a creative solution to continue baking for his neighbours. Through humour and charm, Baking with Boris by Maša Avramović explores themes of resilience, community, and adaptability, capturing the spirit of a small village rallying together and celebrating tradition in the face of change.

#### **Bottle**

South Korea / No Dialogue / 2023

Discarded on a beach alongside other waste, a glass bottle soon finds itself alone as everything else is carried off by the tide. Struggling to connect with a nearby seagull, crab, and clams, it experiences an overwhelming sense of isolation. As a storm rolls in, reflecting its desolation, the bottle's journey subtly captures the consequences of environmental neglect and the enduring need for connection. 'Bottle' uses animation to highlight themes of loneliness and the overlooked impact of human waste.

Paulette, a young girl, sees the same shooting star every night and wishes for the return of her mysteriously missing pet rat. Despite her nightly wish, the pet doesn't come back, and Paulette begins to suspect that something might be wrong with her star. 'Filante' is a touching, dialogue-free animated short that explores themes of hope, loss, and wonder through a visually stunning journey across the night sky. The cut-out animation style adds an element of dreamlike beauty to this poetic tale.

Accompanied by lively music, the film invites children to explore the beauty of nature and the joy of simple, everyday things. Designed for young audiences, this whimsical film brings rice to life in a way that is sure to delight and educate. The stop-motion technique adds a unique touch to this heartwarming tale of appreciation for food and culture.

#### Scrubby



As they navigate the surreal, waterlogged landscapes, each animal must confront the challenges of survival in an unfamiliar environment. Despite their differences, the creatures gradually learn to rely on one another, forging an uneasy but necessary alliance as they sail through this transformed world. The journey is marked by moments of danger and wonder as the animals face obstacles, both external and internal, testing their instincts for self-preservation and community.

The film presents a visually stunning, dialogue-free experience that relies on powerful imagery and emotional nuance to convey its themes. Through the vivid, dreamlike landscapes, the animals' interactions speak to the primal forces of survival, fear, and cooperation. The film explores how isolation and togetherness shape the characters' experiences in a post-disaster reality, offering a contemplative look at how creatures—human or otherwise—adapt to new environments. As they travel through this flooded world, the animals discover not only the vastness of the transformed landscape, but also the potential for connection in a time of profound uncertainty.

#### **Through Rocks and Clouds**

In the isolated Andes, 8-year-old Feliciano lives a simple life, herding alpacas and sharing his excitement about Peru's World Cup qualifiers with his loyal companions—a young alpaca named Ronaldo and his dog, Rambo. Beneath this peaceful routine, however, lies a growing threat to his village: a mining company that has contaminated their land and water, pressuring villagers to sell their property. As Feliciano's community grapples with the environmental destruction and the potential loss of their homes, the situation takes a personal turn when he discovers that his alpaca, Ronaldo, has gone missing.

While his village fights to resist the corporate takeover, Feliciano embarks on a determined search for his beloved animal. His journey through the Andes highlights the struggles faced by indigenous communities who find themselves caught between preserving their traditional ways of life and the destructive forces of modern industry. Through Feliciano's eyes, the film presents a deeply human story of innocence, resilience, and the fight for survival, set against the backdrop of the majestic but threatened Andean landscape.

The film's narrative resonates deeply due to Khosravi's personal background as a Bakhtiari herself. It presents an intimate and compassionate exploration of the sacrifices nomadic women are expected to make in the face of modernity. Shot over several years, 'Requiem for a Tribe' not only highlights the emotional and physical struggles of Hajar but also becomes a testament to the fading traditions of nomadic life in Iran. This documentary, supported by major international film funds, such as the Hot Docs CrossCurrents Fund and Doha Film Institute, is a compelling reflection on identity, survival, and the cost of progress.

As challenges mount and time slips away, he encounters relentless obstacles, from run-ins with the police to social isolation and the daily uncertainties that define his existence. The film unfolds over two pivotal days, capturing Souleymane's journey in a tense, fast-paced sequence that immerses viewers in his world.

Director Boris Lojkine crafts a strikingly authentic portrayal, blending documentary-inspired realism with a powerful narrative structure. Through intimate cinematography, audiences are transported into Paris's heart, encountering a version of the city seldom witnessed—one where survival requires resilience, resourcefulness, and courage. As Souleymane approaches the interview that could determine his future, the film reveals a deeply human story of determination and fortitude in the face of overwhelming odds, offering an unfiltered look into the invisible lives of undocumented workers and their fight for a place in society.

### Ways to Traverse a Territory

'Formas de atravesar un territorio' / Mexico / Spanish, Tsotsil / 2024 72 mins



In the remote highlands of Chiapas, Mexico, indigenous Tsotsil women shepherd their sheep and weave wool, preserving traditions that have been passed down for generations. Their connection to the land is sacred, and through their work, they honour the memory and history of their ancestors. This documentary follows their daily lives, revealing how their identity and cultural heritage are deeply tied to the territory they inhabit. The filmmaker's journey to the mountains opens up a dialogue about what it means to belong to a place.

By observing the Tsotsil women and reflecting on her own memories tied to the land, the film explores how personal and collective identities are shaped by our connection to the environment. The documentary combines archival footage, staged moments, and intimate conversations to create a poetic meditation on cultural preservation, the passage of time, and the transformation of landscapes. Through its stunning visuals and contemplative tone, 'Ways to Traverse a Territory' examines the relationship between people and the land they call home, offering a rich reflection on memory, identity, and the enduring ties that bind us to our environments.

Mokhtar's oxygen tank, damaged during their fight, was empty, leaving him to suffocate. Eesa now faces a harrowing decision—remain silent and be hailed as a hero or confess his involvement and be branded a killer. This short film explores themes of guilt, truth, and the moral consequences of one's actions.



## **Meeting with Pol Pot**

In the late 1970s, Democratic Kampuchea—under the rule of the Khmer Rouge—remains one of the world's most mysterious and secretive regimes. In 1978, three French journalists are invited by the regime to conduct an exclusive interview with its leader, Pol Pot. Upon arrival, they are presented with an image of utopia: orderly cities, industrious workers, and a harmonious society. However, as their stay progresses, the cracks in this carefully constructed image begin to show. The journalists discover the devastating reality—a nation on the brink of collapse, a government teetering between paranoia and violence, and a population devastated by genocide.

Inspired by Elizabeth Becker's personal account, 'When the War Was Over', the film blends historical fact with fiction, drawing viewers into the moral dilemmas faced by journalists in war zones. Director Rithy Panh, whose work often delves into the horrors of the Khmer Rouge era, uses the film to explore themes of truth, manipulation, and the ethical responsibilities of the media. As the journalists come face to face with the brutal realities of the regime, they are forced to confront not only the atrocities they witness—but also the power of propaganda and their role as observers in shaping history.

Each film, ranging from 3 to 6 minutes, offers a unique and personal lens into life in Gaza under siege. The project provides an intimate and poignant portrayal of the human experience in a war-torn enclave, where survival, loss, and hope coexist in fragile balance. Through the perspectives of both seasoned and emerging filmmakers, the collection captures the raw emotions and everyday struggles of life under occupation, giving voice to those whose stories are often silenced.

Covering a variety of genres—including fiction, documentary, animation, and experimental cinema—the films explore universal themes such as resilience, displacement, family, and the human spirit's capacity to endure. Despite the severe challenges faced during production, from restricted resources to the constant threat of violence, the filmmakers managed to create a powerful anthology that highlights the vibrant artistic scene in Gaza. The project stands as both a testament to the filmmakers' perseverance and a reflection of the collective experience of a people enduring unimaginable hardship, capturing moments of beauty, pain, and defiance.

His 2002 documentary 'Jenin, Jenin' sparked controversy for its depiction of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Despite legal battles, Bakri continues to use cinema as a platform to voice Palestinian narratives. 'Janin Jenin' is his latest exploration of life in occupied territories.

Director Mohammad Bakri revisits the Jenin refugee camp, reflecting on the devastation caused by Israel's 2023 military invasion. Building on the framework of his 2002 documentary 'Jenin, Jenin', this new film captures the ongoing struggle of the camp's residents as they recount their experiences of destruction, loss, and resistance. Divided into four parts, the documentary begins by revisiting the events of 'Jenin, Jenin', followed by an exploration of the legal challenges Bakri has faced for over two decades. The third section presents a historical overview of the Palestinian refugee crisis since 1948.

The final segment—focusing on the testimonies of those who endured the latest military offensive—reveals the personal toll of continuous conflict. Bakri's empathetic direction allows these voices to emerge with unfiltered emotional power, shedding light on the persistence of suffering under occupation. While the film confronts difficult truths, it serves as an essential perspective on a conflict too often seen through a single lens. 'Janin Jenin' challenges audiences to consider the deeper, human implications of an enduring political struggle.

#### An Orange from Jaffa

Mohammed, a young Palestinian, embarks on a tense journey to cross an Israeli checkpoint with a temporary Polish identity card. After being turned down by other drivers, Farouk, a well-meaning taxi driver, offers him a ride. However, they soon encounter severe trouble when the checkpoint authorities discover Mohammed's previous failed attempt to cross. The film powerfully captures the oppressive reality of life under occupation and the personal costs involved.

prestigious International Grand Prix. Almughanni's films often explore the emotional landscapes of individuals living under occupation, drawing on his own experiences and

reflecting the broader Palestinian struggle.

#### The Deer's Tooth

In Dheisheh refugee camp, young Wisam struggles with grief and isolation following his younger brother's death. When he finds his brother's last milk tooth, memories resurface, reminding him of his promise to throw it into the sea—an unreachable place due to restrictions. Determined to keep his word, Wisam sets out on a dangerous journey that explores themes of love, loss, and resilience. His quest becomes a testament to the strength found in family bonds and the lengths taken to preserve memories.

As his friend urges him to abandon his mission, Said wrestles with loyalty, religious expectations, and his own values in this moving short film about personal conviction.


