
Message from the CEO

The Doha Film Institute set a few firsts in the Arab region for a film organisation in 2019, with its latest co-financed project It Must Be Heaven by auteur Elia Suleiman selected at the 72nd Cannes Film Festival and Capernaum by Nadine Labaki nominated for an Academy Award® for Best Foreign Language Film. These nominations made DFI the only cultural organisation in the MENA region to have had four films nominated in both the foreign language category at the Oscars® and in the Official Selection, Competition of the Cannes Film Festival to date.

To date, over 100 projects have participated at Qumra, guided by 21 Qumra Masters whose vision is synonymous with the best of contemporary cinema.

Through its interactive theme, Find Film, Find Life, Ajyal Film Festival's seventh edition continued to demonstrate the transformative power of storytelling. The idea fuelled us to present a bigger and better Ajyal, in new collaborations with local businesses and public screening venues. Together, we were able to appreciate the incredible strides that Qatar's film industry has taken with the ever-popular Made in Qatar showcase and bridge cultural divides with 96 films sourced from 35 countries. We hope that people will see Ajyal as a unique and important investment in youth development that will bring invaluable returns for the future.





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

We were honoured to partner with The National Museum of Qatar to create a significant legacy of enduring stories that weave the complex tapestry of our identity as Qatari people and bring forward our nation's rich tradition of storytelling.


Bringing these stories to life has enhanced the artistic and economic vibrancy of our country, and we look forward to visitors discovering perspectives that illustrate the rich complexity of Qatar in the beautiful setting of the landmark museum.

This project took on an unprecedented size and scope, using technology in a way that has never been used before: 21.54 billion screen pixels per second and the use of 112 4K projectors, to name just a couple of unparalleled statistics. To put that in perspective, a modern iMax movie theatre displays just 0.2 billion pixels per second. We are confident this new approach to art films and museum exhibitions will change the conversation and shift the paradigm of how museums are experienced. **112** 4K digital cinema projectors

Art in all its forms is a building block of modern society. Throughout history, we have shaped and created art, yet, in turn, it has also moulded our understanding of identity and Arab heritage.

Together with Doha Film Institute as lead producers, the National Museum of Qatar has created a moving roadmap of ground-breaking firsts through these visual masterpieces that help us understand the evolution of our nation.

Each piece is singular in its creativity and execution, exploring questions of origin, identity and existence that are both universal and unique to life in Qatar.

The Museum is an exciting destination of learning and cultural preservation that will enrich perspectives for people from all around the world, and that will endure as a great source of pride for generations to come.

The National Museum of Qatar is a narrative chronological museum that takes the visitor through a vast journey of time, from 700 million years ago to the present day. A combined museography approach with art films, oral histories, and objects has been integrated in the exhibits. The art films' emotive and immersive approach complements the object displays, placing those objects in both natural and imagined environments. The National Museum of Qatar's successful collaboration with Doha Film Institute brings the history of Qatar to life through various films that were shot in present day Qatar.

The technology to capture, post-produce and display images and sounds at the level of fidelity required by the NMoQ simply did not exist, so Doha Film Institute invented it. And as the Institute developed the technology, it became obvious we also needed to define an entirely new visual language for composition, motion, storytelling and emotional connection to the viewer, all with a level of image and sound quality never before offered to the general public.

The result is closer to virtual reality than cinema, with viewers experiencing the art films as "windows" into other realities. There is currently nothing comparable to this installation anywhere on Earth.



UN Day Concert 2019

Celebrating Women's Empowerment

To mark the 74th anniversary of the United Nations - a historic concert was held on the theme of 'Building Prosperity for All through Culture, Education, Gender Equality, Sports and Sustainability', organised by the Department of Global Communications with the Permanent Mission of the State of Qatar to the United Nations, and with support from Qatar's Supreme Committee for Delivery and Legacy and Doha Film Institute.





The special UN Day Concert aimed to highlight the sustainable development goals and the urgent need to implement the 2030 Agenda to bring long-lasting benefits to communities, regions and countries, focusing on the role of culture, sports, education and gender equality by showcasing women in leadership roles in the Middle East, especially in the arts.

The performance celebrated Qatari women who shattered classical music's glass ceiling and defied social norms to compose, perform, teach and conduct classical music, and showcased the talent of the Qatar Philharmonic Orchestra along with some of the State's leading artists, including Ms. Dana Al Fardan, Ms. Aisha, Mr. Fahad Al Kubaisi and Ms. Hala Al-Emadi.

That is why we ensure that our workshops, labs and consultations offer the necessary creative space for the discovery and development of an authentic personal voice. Instead of learning isolated skills, our filmmakers typically engage in every stage of production from conception to completion to gain a full understanding of the process.



Labs

The Workshops and Labs our Training & Development Programme hosts combine theory, demonstrations, and practical exercises to train the participants on the technical aspects of filmmaking. DFI draws mentors from among the world's most respected and recognised professionals. Our mentors provide tangible knowledge to invest in the development of skills in all areas of the filmmaking process.

Short Scriptwriting Lab

December 2018 / January 2019

DFI's Short Scriptwriting Lab assisted new and emerging screenwriters and writer-directors in developing and writing a screenplay from an original idea with the support of international mentors. 

Screenwriting for Beginners Lab August 2019



DFI has made it a priority to invest in youth. During 2019, the youth-focused initiatives we held included workshops, international exchange programmes, training young jurors at Ajyal and offering our young people an opportunity to be exposed to a prestigious international film festival.

Our Youth Programmes are designed to empower and equip young people to make films on issues that are important to them. We help our young participants gain the confidence to explore film production, while having fun and creating films that tell their stories, in their unique way.

From film appreciation to acting classes, from filmmaking to the fine art of great storytelling, our Youth Programme is a journey into the process of creative collaboration. Our workshops provide an outlet and an opportunity for youth to speak up about the changes they want to see in their lives, their community and the world.



Youth Animation Workshop February 2019 Mentor: Nathan Otano

In collaboration with Les Gobelins Animation School. DFI offered the opportunity for our young people to benefit from a week-long training programme that introduced the methods of traditional 2D animation. From the history of the art right through to learning how to design and animate characters and backgrounds from scratch, the course was a hands-on experience.

Stop-motion Shadow Animation Workshop

June 2019 Mentor: Fadi Syriani

This workshop was an introduction to different techniques required for creating and producing a stop-motion animated film. Participants learnt the tricks and techniques that enable a deeper appreciation of this form of artistic storytelling.

Youth Photography Workshop

October 2019 Mentor: Tanya Habjouqa

The workshop introduced the basic techniques of the art form and encouraged youth to take up creative storytelling through photography, using a compact digital camera or smartphone. Taught in a fun environment, the class focused on exploration and developing a love of photography and the visual arts.


Qatari Film Fund

Grants Programme

Our Grants Programme seeks to discover and support emerging talent. DFI's focus through its grants programme is to unveil the talent of first-and-second time filmmakers from Qatar, the wider Arab region, and around the world by funding their productions, giving their films the opportunity to reach audiences. DFI's Grants Programme facilitates exchanges of creativity, knowledge and professional collaborations among filmmakers. We assist our Grantees interact, connect, evaluate and grow through our own events such as Qumra and Ajyal. We ensure that the exposure and the experience they gain thereafter is utilized as a springboard to go beyond, tour international festivals and capture the attention of audiences across the globe. In order to keep pace with evolving trends in the industry and to reach growing audiences who use technologies that go beyond traditional cinema, DFI funds work that includes television and web series.

In 2019, DFI granted films had over 10 theatrical releases, earned more than 85 awards at major international film events, in addition to several more at smaller festivals and exceeded over 390 festival selections. 79 of our granted films participated at some of the most prestigious festivals in the world including the Academy Awards, Sundance Film Festival, Berlin International Film Festival, Festival de Cannes, Sarajevo Film Festival, Locarno International Film Festival, Venice International Film Festival, Toronto International Film Festival, International Documentary Film Festival and the International Film Festival Rotterdam.


















DFI Making Headlines

The International Influence of **DFI's Funding**

A team of researchers led by Joelle Farchy (dir.), **Gregoire Bideau et Steven Tallec from the School** of Media at La Sorbonne (EMNS), set out to take a deep dive into the growth of film and the development of film projects that reached the level of competition at international film festivals.

Seeking to conduct a Research under the title "In competition - A decade of international film festivals", the research team hoped to trace the footprint of cinematic creations that entered competing from 2010 onwards, while creating space to offer the researcher's perspective on what took place during this time span and who played a significant role.

In the paper, published by Presses des Mines, Les Cahiers de l'EMNS, the nation of Qatar drew attention. Given that Qatar, through DFI had taken up an influential role, funding film projects that made their mark at International Film Festivals, the Research shone a light on the role the DFI played. The paper also pointed out the growth of female filmmakers and recorded the arc of their progress. The following translated excerpt offers a glimpse into the project.

Une décennie de festivals internationaux de cinéma.

Qatar has gained a reputation for being a nation where the internationalization of film production is being pushed to its peak. While being a relatively small nation that has experienced rapid economic development thanks to its natural resources, Qatar has expressed its desire to become a major cultural player in the Arab world. Culture, and particularly cinema, has become a geopolitical tool of soft power. With the ubiquitous presence of the Middle East's media power, the international broadcaster Al-Jazeera being housed in Qatar, the country has stepped up to invest more and more in film production. In the oil-rich country, films are emerging as fast as skyscrapers.

Before 2010, there was no trace of Qatari funding in the films presented at festivals. Then, between 2010 and 2018, we count 93 different films financed in part by Qatar, all co-produced and corresponding to 169 festival selections with a spike of 52 films selected at festivals in 2017.

Among the co-producing countries, we find in first place France (41 films) and second Germany (21 films). Thus, 67% of the films presented at festivals are the fruit of a collaboration with France or Germany.

The approach of the Doha Film Institute (DFI), created in 2010, is unique in that so far, we have not noticed the presence of directors of Qatari nationality in the filmmaking scene. Khalil Benkirane, DFI's Head of Grants said at Cannes in 2016 that the objective of this funding was to "create a space for a family of filmmakers from around the world, where they can exchange and ideally collaborate at a given time".

The analysis of films co-produced by Qatar revealed that half of the filmmakers come from countries of the Maghreb or the Middle East: Palestine in particular showed a presence with seven directors along with Lebanon, Morocco, Tunisia, Iran, Egypt, Kuwait, Syria, Algeria, Iraq, and Jordan. Originally destined exclusively for Arab Cinema, DFI's funding is also open to productions from directors of countries further away from its borders, like China and Singapore in 2016 or Brazil in 2018.

The choice of languages spoken in a film can indeed reveal the intentions of its director, its producer and even the programmer of a festival.

Qumra connected DFI's local, regional and international grantees and co-financed projects, the Qatari Film Fund, and year-round education and development participants with leading industry professionals and cinema masters to complete the life cycle of successful film projects.



Qumra's 2019 programme featured a robust calendar of industry meetings designed to assist with and propel projects to their next stages of development. These included masterclasses, work-in-progress screenings, bespoke matchmaking sessions and tailored tutorials with industry experts. The creative exchanges at Qumra took place alongside a programme of public screenings curated with input from the Qumra Masters.







Qumra Industry

150 acclaimed filmmakers, industry professionals and experts gathered at Qumra 2019 to nurture the 36 Qumra Projects by first and second-time filmmakers. Several of them have formed strong bonds with this unique event, which has become an important platform and project incubator for new voices and compelling stories in Arab and world cinema.

The 2019 Qumra industry delegates included representation from more than 15 leading international film festivals, and executives from some of the world's leading film production companies, sales and distribution companies, and cultural and funding agencies. The international delegates at Qumra came from countries ranging from Chile to Italy, Canada to Japan and the UK to the USA among others.
