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

An extra Special 10th edition of Ajyal Film Festival and an exceptionally curated public programme, the Doha Film Experience, celebrated cinema presenting the very best in Arab and international filmmaking, pop culture and art—another compelling example of how we bring together creative talent with the community to promote greater cultural understanding.

From year-round workshops and mentorship with master filmmakers and film professionals to film financing initiatives and annual public and industry events, we remain deeply committed to creating a thriving film ecosystem that provides script-to-screen support for new voices in cinema from across the globe.

It is especially gratifying that films—many by Qatari directors—supported by the Institute have had exceptional international success in recent years, winning top accolades at global film festivals and winning over audiences around the world in 2022. In many ways, this past year was one of elevated global success for the Institute, as we celebrated an incredible achievement for local cinema with our first ever Oscar©-qualified film in consideration for an Academy Award.

The undeniable success achieved by the Doha Film Institute is a testament to our dedicated professionals and ingrained belief in the power of film to make positive change. I thank my DFI family for their commitment, ability to innovate, and genuine passion for cinema.

I am confident that our achievements in 2022 will continue to inspire us to break boundaries and empower more talented young filmmakers to achieve global acclaim for their authentic stories and amplify important new voices in world cinema.

Sheikha Al Mayassa bint Hamad Bin Khalifa Al Thani Chair, Doha Film Institute The Doha Film Institute's year-round activities documented in this report reiterates our commitment to supporting outstanding films by emerging filmmakers that serve a higher purpose: To build empathy, break down stereotypes and misconceptions, promote hope, and foster cultural understanding through the powerful language of cinema.

In 2022, we continued to seek out new voices in cinema, extending our support to 79 diverse projects from around the world, including 19 films helmed by women directors and 11 by Qatari talent. This is in addition to five projects selected for the Qatari Film Fund that included two narrative feature films, all helmed by Qatari nationals.

We also had an exceptional year to celebrate a very Special 10th Edition of our Ajyal Film Festival in 2022, which coincided with the hosting of the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022TM.

The one-of-a-kind cultural initiative, Ajyal Jury Experience, was a spectacular success as we brought together 613 jurors from 50 countries to watch and analyse 48 films from 30 countries. The enthusiasm of these young jurors—the heartbeat of the festival—was infectious as they deliberated and critiqued the films.

This was followed by a spectacular cultural showcase of events, the Doha Film Experience, an unmissable festival of creativity that celebrated the very best in local and international filmmaking, creativity and art. The Doha Film Experience was a true tribute to our nation, leadership and community, highlighting our rich cultural diversity and the vibrant cinematic ecosystem we have built over the years.

One of the proudest moments for the Institute in 2022 was young Qatari filmmaker Majid Al-Remaihi's documentary short film, 'And Then They Burn The Sea', making history as our country's first Oscar©-qualified film in consideration for an Academy Award®. The international acclaim for this film, like many others supported by the Doha Film Institute, reflects the far-reaching impact of our diverse year-round initiatives to nurture a new generation of independent voices in cinema.

Qumra Master Rithy Panh, who lent his expert guidance to the film, observed: "Majid's visionary approach will inspire talented emerging filmmakers from around the world to believe in their own cinematic ambitions".



His words echo our aspiration and intent to be a sounding board for emerging filmmakers from around the world to realise their cinematic dreams. To date, we have supported more than 750 projects from 70 countries through our Grants programme, the region's longest-serving film development initiative.

This is the result of our concerted focus, even during the challenges of recent years, to ensure that support remains available and accessible to young filmmakers along their script-to-screen journey. We are proud of the international acclaim our alumni have garnered for their projects and continue to inspire younger creative talent to pursue their creative aspirations.

This journey would not have been possible without the invaluable guidance of our leadership, the support of our Board of Trustees, the dedication of my fantastic team at DFI, and the blessings of our many partners and industry stalwarts, who have generously committed their invaluable time and expertise to ensure that our emerging talents have the right resources and opportunities to make films that matter.





Introduction To Film Studies with Richard Pena

31 July - 7 August 2022

This eight-part mini-course covered the basic techniques filmmakers have at their disposal in order to convey information and create meaning in film. The first six sessions introduced the major avenues of expression: cinematography, camera movement editing, mise-en-scène, sound and narrative. In the final two sessions, all participants engaged in close, detailed readings of two films.

Screenwriting For Beginners (English)

11 - 15 August 2022

In this fascinating online lab, participants discovered the creative process of writing for the screen. The workshop included the foundations of screenwriting, with mentors covering the 'architecture' of screenplays (storytelling, screenplay guidelines, nonverbal storytelling and characterization) and the 'formatting' of a screenplay (visual grammar and Celtx/Final Draft). Participants were also provided with the opportunity to continue their filmmaking journey with the DFI development team, working towards further education and grants.




Qumra Moves Online in 2022

Despite the global pandemic, Qumra 2022 continued its mission to support independent cinema voices on their script-to-screen journey in two streams of virtual programming. The first comprising of tutorials, workshops, consultations, and virtual meetings for projects in development, and the second featuring work-in-progress screenings and feedback sessions for projects in post-production.

In presenting this online edition, Qumra strove to provide much-needed support to emerging filmmakers to bring their projects to fruition without compromising their personal wellness.

Film industry professionals supported the development of 45 projects through over 280 online mentoring sessions, screenings with feedback panels, roundtables and over 350 curated industry meetings.

Qumra Projects



This year's virtual edition of Qumra 2022 nurtured forty-five projects, including twenty-eight features, six series, and eleven short film projects by filmmakers from twenty-five countries. Of the projects, thirty-nine were recipients of the DFI Grants and twenty-six were supported through DFI training programmes.

Qatari filmmakers highlighted the evolution of the homegrown film industry through sixteen projects, including thirteen by Qatari nationals across various formats, such as feature narratives and documentaries, series, and shorts.

Through stories of human resilience and triumph, and themes shaped by contemporary geopolitics and social dynamics, this year's selected projects will help shape the future of storytelling and redefine world cinema.







QFF also supports up to four feature films per year. Since its inception in 2015, QFF has exceeded all expectations and helped develop a vibrant community of dedicated and talented local filmmakers who are now making their mark on the global stage.

Although the global film industry was on a slow recovery from the effects of Covid-19, QFF managed to bounce back relatively quickly with 13 projects in development during 2022. 
